The Wright Brothers

That they had no more than a public high school education and little money never stopped them in their mission to take to the air. - Why was the story of the Wright brothers' achievement so unlikely? Think about the hardships, knowledge deficits, and other obstacles they had to overcome in order to get their invention off the ground, so to speak.
- The Wright family circle—especially Sister Katharine and Bishop Milton Wright influenced Orville and Wilbur and their achievement. Upbringing and genetics both play roles in individual accomplishment. To what extent are all of us shaped by our family environment? How much of our accomplishments are fully our own?
- What goes into creating genius like the Wright brothers exhibited, aside from sheer intelligence? Consider traits such as perseverance, focus, and energy. What else? What about the role of imagination?
- In 1908, when the Wrights finally showed their plane to the press, one reporter wrote: "this spectacle of men flying was so startling, so bewildering to the senses...that we all stood like so many marble men." Imagine yourself in that situation: how might you have reacted? Can you think of a future technological advancement that might astonish you the same way?
